Residents' Security

Due to an unwanted increase in anti-social behaviour in parts of the parish, particularly in the trading and use of illegal substances, the Parish Council decided to install a security camera at the north end of Hillside East. The camera is now in place and the area is being monitored by the borough council. The camera and monitoring service was funded jointly by the Parish Council and Borough Councillor Andrew Eade, and as the work was carried out in collaboration with our neighbouring Church Aston Council, Telford and Wrekin reduced the overall price for the joint schemes by £3,000.

Road Safety

The long-awaited Village Traffic Scheme to introduce traffic calming measures and reduce the speed limit to 20mph, has gone through the final stages of the Traffic Order process, and Telford and Wrekin have instructed their contractors to proceed with the installation works. Hopefully we will see the works under way this coming month.

A further scheme developed by Councillor Andrew Eade has been agreed with Telford and Wrekin to install speed ramps and a SID facility on Humber Lane near the junction with Body Road. In addition to these two active schemes, the Parish Council has produced a schedule of road safety schemes on the A518, for submission to Telford and Wrekin Council. Introduction of 20mph Speed Limit throughout the village.

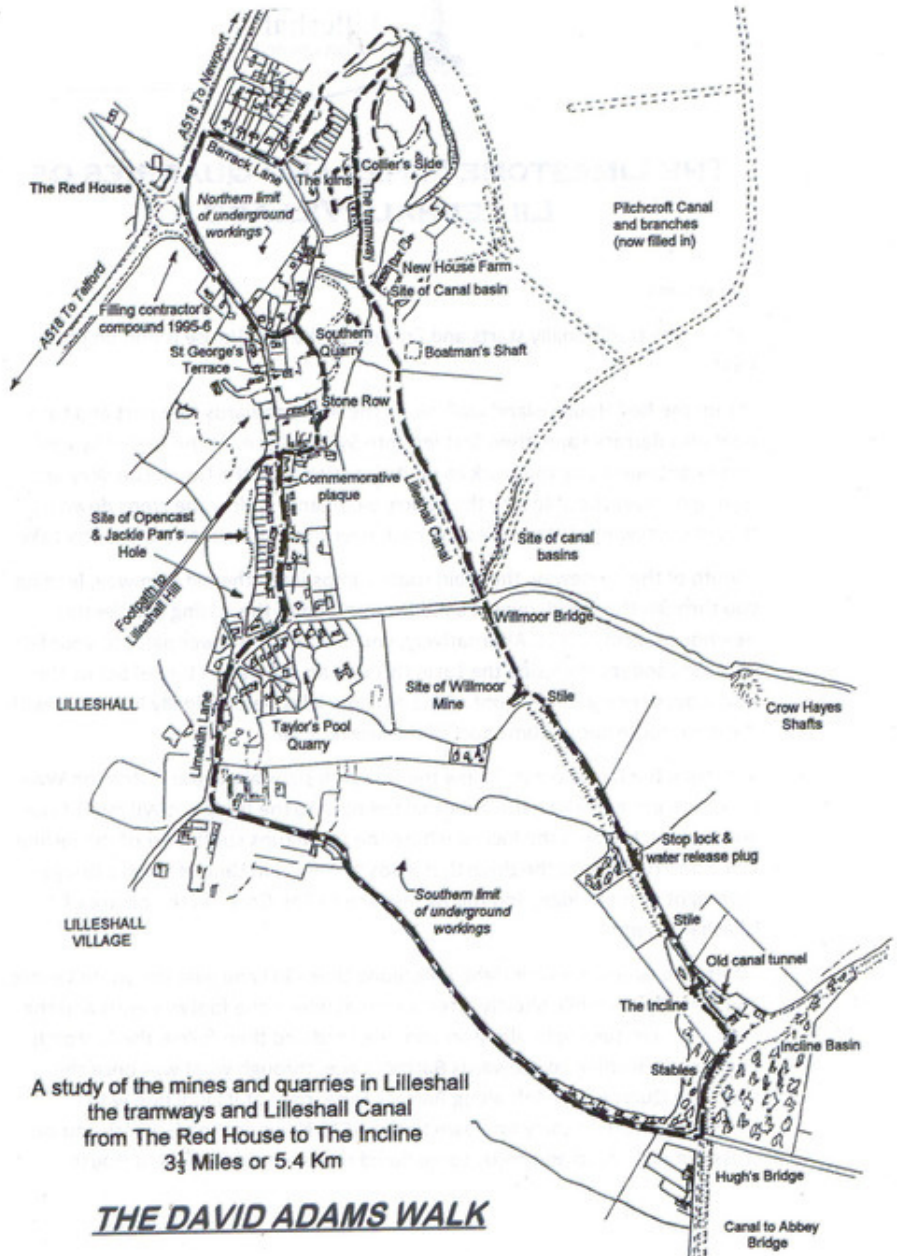

David Adams Walk

The limestone mines and quarries of Lilleshall Village

Directions:

This route traditionally starts and finishes at the Red House Island on the A518.

From the Red House Island walk along the A518, towards Newport and turn right into Barrack Lane then first left into Sylvan Close. At the end of Sylvan Close continue along the track as far its junction with the Hutchinson Way and turn right, over the stile into the quarry woodland. Follow the steps down to a timber causeway which carries the path over the northern arm of quarry lake.

South of the causeway, the main route climbs up to the old tramway, leading you through the wood, over the kilns and up to the kissing gate by the Newhouse Farm Access. Alternatively, you can follow a lower path, to your left, which meanders alongside the lake, through an old wagon tunnel below the tramway, opening out in front of the old lime kilns before finally linking up with the main route about 50m short of the kissing gate.

Crossing the farm access, follow the footpath signs along the Hutchison Way, past the farm and along the old canal towpath to the bridge at Willmoor Lane, and then on towards the incline where the route runs southwest of the incline plane and right along the drive that leads to Old Farm Lane at Hugh's Bridge. Turn right at the bridge and follow the lane to The Green in the centre of Lilleshall Village.

With the green on your right, walk along Limekiln Lane past the Youth Centre and steadily downhill. Shortly after that point where the footway ends and the road narrows, turn right along an unmade road and then follow the footpath posts leading you towards Barrack Lane, through what was once the southern Quarry. Turn left along Barrack Lane, right at its junction with Limekiln Lane, then carry on down to the A518 Newport Road, where you can cross the main road and enjoy some liquid refreshments in the Red House!

This would be a great benefit to the community, and you would be helping keep Lilleshall clean and tidy!

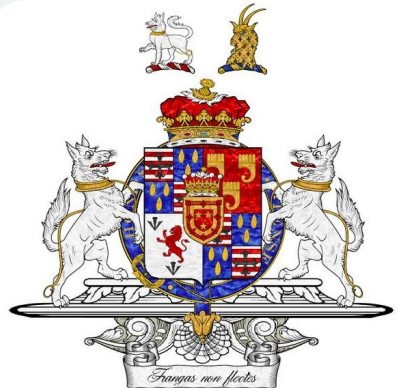

Were there Wolves or Lions on Lilleshall Hill?

The Tale is...

A common tale around Lilleshall is that there were 4 stone lions seated at the corners of the monument. These were removed, possibly when hit by lightning sometime in the early 20th century, or they were moved by vandals, with two finishing up in Lilleshall Hall, or in a field near hill farm, and two were placed at the entrance to what we know as Cheswell Drive.



Were they Wolves or Lions?

Some facts

- The Leveson-Gower family who bought Lilleshall Abbey during the Dissolution of the monasteries and subsequently climbed the social ladder and landed gentlefolk to dukedom, possessed a coat of arms bearing wolves rampant.
- The monument was commissioned in 1833 on behalf of local tenants who raised 300 pounds to construct the column as a "testimonial of their respect and gratitude to the duke and their liberal Landlord". Perhaps some of his Scottish tenants may have thought differently about their landlord.

- The foundation stone was laid on 7th October 1833 and work continued to the design of a Mr Harrison of Stone. A description of the scheme was published in the Gentleman magazine for November 1833 stating Mr Harrison's design included "... A wolf couchant carved in stone will ornate each wing..."
- It appears that there was more than one designer, and in fact Mr Harrison designed the obelisk we see today, and Sir Francis Chanter, an acclaimed sculptor, designed the wolf statues.

This all seems to lead towards a conclusion that the statues would have been wolves rather than lions, and one look at the statues in Cheswell Drive would raise the question:

Who would produce such emaciated lions with wolf like jaws?

Did they actually make it up the hill?

The Facts:

- Although work on the obelisk was under way in October 1833. A start on the sculptures appears to have been delayed until October 1834, one month after the progress on the obelisk was reporting to be near completion. The wolf statue design of Sir Francis would have required substantial modifications to the monument base to provide slabs on each wing for the wolves to lie on, and he specifies that the stone for the wolves had to come from a different quarry to that used on the obelisk. Mr Harrison and his team must have been really pleased with this!
- A drawing for the monument with wolves attached shows corner plinths which require chamfers on each corner of the base, and a slab of around 2m in width to carry each of the wolves, which are 2.5m long and 1.2m wide. This would require major modification of the base and no doubt a substantial increase in cost - a contractors dream project!

Questions

If the modifications were carried out, what has happened to the four plinths, and why are the corners of the base square not chamfered?

How did they move four 1 tonne wolves up the hill without breaking them, and how were they, and their plinths moved back down without further damage?

Why bother with all this extra work when the wolves could easily be placed in the grounds of the newly completed Lilleshall Hall instead?

We do know where two wolves are now located, but where are wolves three and four?

A Greener Memorial Hall

A lot of people will have noticed the fact that the roof of the Memorial Hall is now boasting solar panels, which were installed earlier in the year. However, because we are having a system that stores the energy created, the accompanying batteries were not available and were not put into place until early in October. The total installation cost was in excess of £17,000.00.

The incentive for this came from "Telford and Wrekin Climate Change Fund" who were making funds (up to £5,000.00) available for

organisations within the Borough to make their own contribution to arrest the growth in global warming. This means that the balance has been provided from our own funds.





The Memorial Hall Committee made up of representatives from the Parish Council and the Parochial Church Council together with co-opted members thought long and hard about spending this amount of money but in fact we came to the conclusion that in the final analysis we had no alternative, in view of the catastrophes that other countries in the world have suffered in terms of floods, famine and droughts.

So we feel that we are making, albeit a small contribution to problems that the world is currently facing.

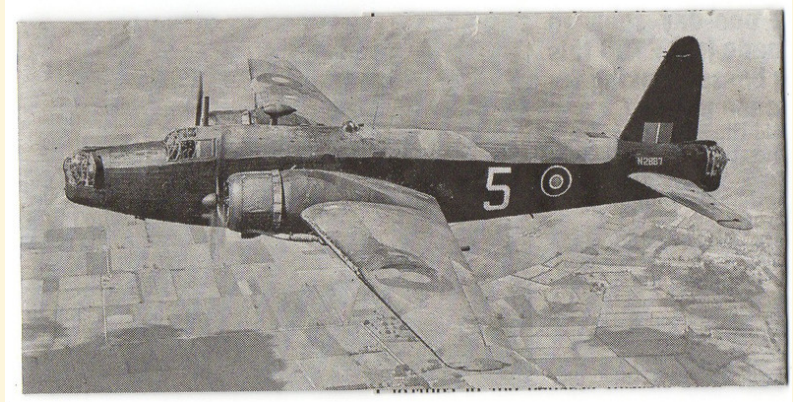
Did you know?

A wartime tragedy occurred in Lilleshall on November 20th, 1944, at 11.55 hrs claiming the life of the pilot of a Super Marine Seafire Fighter. The Seafire Fighter collided with the Wellington Bomber, killing all six crew members, which was flying from R.A.F. Market Harbough in adverse weather.

Eyewitness accounts provided of the incident read, "three of us were working in a field between the red house pub and Lilleshall Monument when a large plane came over the Hill lower and lower, crashed and exploded, spreading the crews' bodies and grazing sheep over a large area producing a huge crater".

**The Seafire Fighter crashed at Ketley Brook Killing Sub.
Lt. John Brooke aged 19 years old and newly married.**



As far as I am aware, this incident is the only one recorded which occurred on active service during WW2 that happened in Lilleshall. The crew members came from all parts of the country so consequently their names are not recorded on the Roll of Honour in Lilleshall Church.

Perhaps, consideration should be given to a plaque being placed on Lilleshall Hill which overlooks the crash site recording their names and details.
